COMMUNIQUE ON VACCINE JUSTICE: A collective call to action from CSOs, Government Agencies and Marginalized Communities in Kenya

Our shared belief is that comprehensive information about vaccines, their expiration dates, side effects, advantages, disadvantages, and allergenic reactions must be readily available to all. - 8. We collectively advocate for the creation of central vaccination points in underserved areas for easy access.
- 9. We call for public engagement in vaccine policy decisions and the implementation of service charters for vaccination facilities.
